

Meridian District Eagle Packet “Handout” Presentation

- Paperwork – Application, Workbook, Advancement Form
- Process
 - Project
 - Get Advisor
 - Pick Project
 - Get approval from “beneficiary”
 - Get approval from Scoutmaster / Advisor
 - Write up Project
 - Get approval of plan from “beneficiary,” Scoutmaster, Committee Rep
 - Do “mock” Board of Review if you can
 - Make three copies of your plan for Board Members to review
 - Schedule Project BOR (first Thursday of every month – Dan Hugens)
 - Have the BOR (accepted, conditional, or rejected). Advisor comes along.
 - Do the Project
 - Get completion sign-off from “beneficiary”
 - Write-up how it went, what went wrong, and what you did to correct it
 - Final Board of Review
 - Make sure you have all of your Merit Badges completed
 - Make sure you have your Leadership requirement completed
 - Get a copy of your records from Council – compare yours to theirs, then get sign-off from Council (appointment with Pam Smith)
 - Fill out paperwork – cross out required Merit Badges you didn’t do
 - Get reference letters – Scouts request, collect, and put these in the binders
 - Have Scoutmaster Conference
 - Get final sign-off from Scoutmaster, Committee Chairperson
 - Schedule final BOR (third Thursday of every month – Myron Hagen)
 - Have final BOR. Advisor comes along.
 - **YOU MADE IT!**
 - Project cannot benefit commerce, persons, or the BSA
 - Project cannot raise money (except to fund the project)
 - The Project needs to demonstrate your leadership
 - The Project Plan must be so clear and complete that another Scout could use it, without any other information, to do the Project without your help.
 - Call at least a week in advance to book a Board of Review.
 - Everything must be done before you turn 18. Don’t wait until the last minute!
 - Get a copy of your records from the Council and make sure your application and the Council records “match.”
 - If your Eagle Advisor has never “advised” before, advise them to get advice.
 - Check your Troop, District, and Council websites for “aids.”
